


SMART VILLAGES – a new way forward

Juniper Networks and HOPE foundation

ASHAKIRANA, Juniper's vision of a Smart Village (ASHAKIRANA, meaning a 'ray of hope') envisages technology and network connectivity promoting development leading to a higher quality of life.

ASHAKIRANA is indeed spreading hope in the poor children's lives across Orohalli and Jadigenahalli panchayats in Karnataka. We are serving just over 500 children. The project is supported by Juniper Networks

and is based in Orohalli Grama Panchayat, in

Hosakote Taluk of Bangalore Rural district in Karnataka, India.

It is located about thirty kilometers away from Bangalore city which is a business and commercial hub.

There is a total of 11 villages being reached out to, with an estimated population of 6500. The main economic base of these villages is derived from vegetable farming, daily labour and as garment workers.

There are 6 lower primary, 4 higher primary schools and 10 anganwadis in the Orohalli panchayat. Out of these, ASHAKIRANA Project overlooks and has adopted 7 government schools (1 high school, 3 higher primary and 3 lower primary schools along with 7 anganwadis). The government high school adopted is from the neighbouring panchayat of Jadigenahiili. This is being done in pursuit of enhancing the culture of learning through Ashakirana which is operating under HOPE's supervision and services.



Juniper's vision of a Smart Village envisages technology and network connectivity promoting development leading to a higher quality of life. The goal is to make a meaningful impact on people's lives and to support the uneducated and the underserved. This vision is in line with the company's overall mission to "Connect Everything, Empower Everyone. The project started in March 2016.

CHAMPION IN MAKING: Change of fortune due to glimmer of HOPE from ASHAKIRANA

Sahana's poor father toiled day and night to provide her with quality education despite severe poverty in the family. Her father worked selling odd items in streets to support the family. To his disappointment, he found his daughter struggling to do well in academics and the school considered her as failure. That's when we (HOPE staff) motivated her and her father to try enrolling her at the



government school supported by Ashakirana. She was doubtful and reluctant to get admitted. Sahana was under severe mental stress, but started to settle down and began to blossom due to the care, love and guidance of HOPE staff. We felt she had the ability to grow and flourish in life. We also noticed she was a good listener and had a great desire to learn skills in field sports. Hence, we encouraged and trained her every day. To everyone's surprise, she won prizes at the zonal level and was selected to the taluk level. Out of 12 school participants she won the silver medal and got selected for the district level. She was encouraged and worked hard and won yet another silver medal and qualified for Karnataka State level Shotput and Discus Throw.

Overnight she has become a huge celebrity in the village. She grew from a **Loser to Champion.**

HOPE foundation School, Bangalore: Knowledge Building

The idea for the HOPE *foundation* school in Bangalore was born in 1992 during a medical camp in the Id-Gha Mohella slum here. Apart from health care, the community did not have easy access to quality education. There were no affordable schools in the locality – the boys were sent off to work with their fathers as coolies, mechanics or carpenters, while the girls helped their mothers in daily chores.



Two years later, we started a pre-school in a tiny rented room in the colony. We visited every one of the 200 families living here to persuade them to send their children to the school. We eventually started the school with 30 children. Their progress soon inspired other families to send their children to school. In the second year, we got 150 new enrolments!

TODAY, the school is housed in a two-storied building with 372 children from Lower Kindergarten to the 10th grade, with 12 teachers and eight support staff.

Thanks to the support of our committed partners, HOPE foundation School in Bangalore has become a model for digitized learning for our programs across India. Students learn Science with educational gadgets from [Experifun](#). Learning English is fun and interactive through [Zaya](#) and [English Helper](#) software, while [IT Wizard](#) helps students learn technology intuitively. Our library sponsored by Hippocampus gives them access to a wide range of books.

Under the government-sponsored [Midday Meal](#) program, students have hot, nutritious

meals at lunch – for some of them, it is their only square meal in the day. Our after-school program helps students from other schools learn computers and unemployed women learn computers, retail skills and spoken English to help them get jobs.

Skill Development: Computer Training Center, V M Ware

YEAR STARTED: 2015; SUPPORTED BY: V M Ware

The center began in July 2015 in J P Nagar, Bangalore. It aims to train 350 young people over the period of one year in skills in computer including basic, typing, advanced Microsoft Excel, DTP and Tally. The center will also give training in tailoring and spoken English. Aim to place 100 in jobs.



Among our computer graduates, we have placed 25 in jobs, while 69 of our tailoring graduates have started their own tailoring units, mostly based out of their homes. Four women have found jobs as tailors.

A story of self-reliance

This may be story and experience of many women in our society. Gayathri is married with two children. She got married as soon as her studies were completed. Her husband did not allow her to work away from home and for the last five years, she was dependent on her husband for her basic needs. She was eager to be a support and also stand on her own feet financially to some extent. One of her friends informed her about the tailoring course offered by HOPE foundation (V M Ware, Center of HOPE) free of cost. This was an opportunity she said she could not miss as it would provide her the niche to work from home. She was inspired to learn and work from home earning about Rs. 3000 a month, sufficient to take care of most of her personal necessities. She is immensely grateful to HOPE foundation for giving her the knowledge and confidence to be self-sufficient.



Chennai Region

Kannagi Nagar: from displacement to HOPE

Kannagi Nagar Slum Rehabilitation Colony comprises of displaced residents transported from their original dwellings to this location. This is a resettled community, comprising of marginalized and impoverished population. According to the Times of India July 31, 2014 article, only 9 percent of the total child population in the slum had opportunity



to access education facilities. It stated that schools in the area had only 2,000 seats for the 20,000 school going children. Thirty-five percent in the 15-18 age group were dropouts and 42 percent were forced to commute more than 20 kilometres to schools. The 19 ICDS in the area were barely able to accommodate 400 children. Basic facilities such as education and health were found to be underprovided in the colony.

HOPE Foundation Matriculation High School had its origin in 2001. It was established to impart quality education to the children of Kannagi Nagar. It is a need-based program as many school children became dropouts and there was a rising impoverishment in the community due to a loss



of livelihood. HOPE Foundation's main motto is to bring hope and change lives of underprivileged people, and with this in its vision, started a free English medium school called HOPE Foundation Nursery and Primary School in 2001. In 2018-19 academic year, the school became HOPE Foundation Matriculation High School.

Currently 430 plus students are receiving FREE English medium formal education here which will enhance their learning skills and upgrade them so they can achieve better results in their studies. HOPE foundation with the support of HCL Foundation, is implementing "Thinnai Pallikkoodam", an 'After School Program' for the community students of Kannagi Nagar studying at government schools at the same school premises.

From hopelessness to HOPE

Arias Home of HOPE is an orphanage for abandoned women and girl child living with HIV/ AIDS, It was established in July 2001 and is located at Perukkarandai village of Kanchipuram District, about 100 kilometers from Chennai, Tamil Nadu. The Home has cared for over 300 abandoned women and children living with HIV/ AIDS.

The Home provides shelter, food, clothing and medication. The residents are mentored to cope with physical, emotional and psychological stress they face through individual and group counselling. The children from the Home are enrolled in local Government or private schools according to their requirement to pursue their education. The grownup girls are trained in skills such as tailoring and computers in order to enable them to create their own identity in the society. During their spare time, they are involved in various extra-curricular activities.



Mahalaskhmi's family are from Chengalpatu. Both parents died due to HIV/AIDS by the time she was 10. She was being raised by her relatives. A month back, Mahalakshmi met with Latha during her regular medical check-up visit to Tambaram hospital and was encouraged by her to educate herself. On 3rd October she came to Arias Home of Hope as a beneficiary. In the past 15 days she has been cared for and counselled at the Home. She has decided to complete her 10th standard and also use her time to learn tailoring skills.

Kerala Relief work

Kerala flood Relief work at Panamaram and Moncombu (Phase-2)

Panamaram: (Beneficiaries-500)

HOPE foundation carried out the second phase of relief work in Kerala Government school KG section by renovating the school which was supported by CRISIL FOUNDATION. Renovation included repainting the nursery section, mural painting in nursery section, kids' activity tables and chairs. The team also built a hand wash area, donated playground equipment for the school and also a library with books, book shelves and reading table with chairs was set up.

On 27th March 2019, Mr. Sreejith, Regional Manager, CRISIL (CRISIL is a global analytical company providing ratings, research, and risk and policy advisory services) inaugurated and handed over the facilities donated by CRISIL FOUNDATION.

Mr. Gopa Kumar, Senior Director of NTT DATA (30th March 2019) Chennai, inaugurated and handed over the facilities donated by NTTDATA to ATGVHSS and YMPAC schools. The second phase of relief work was implemented by HOPE foundation, Chennai.

NTT DATA helped in rebuilding toilets, renovation of Science Lab, renovation of water facilities. They also donated furniture, generator, inverter, P/A systems, photocopier machine and stationeries to ATGVHSS School. They donated computers with UPS, photocopier machine, P/A system, furniture, printer, construction material for rebuilding the library and electrical materials for rebuilding the library to YMPAC School.

Kerala flood relief work in July

NTT DATA were appreciated for their support in construction of and for providing furnishings for the flood affected school at ATGVHSS, Alappuzha. The school also thanked HOPE foundation for helping in implementation of the work.

We are grateful to the CRISIL foundation for their work in the ongoing construction of toilets at GHSS Achoor, and Kunhome. Toilet renovation in Achoor and Kunhome is in



progress, though delayed by heavy rains in August. In October, construction work of boy's toilets completed at GHSS, Achoor. Construction work of boys' toilets completed and renovation of library work completed at GHSS, Kunhome and Achoor. The handing over program to the beneficiaries (780 students) is scheduled for January 2020.

A library was built at Kunhome to benefit 560 students studying at the school

Delhi Region

Village of HOPE is one of the earliest projects of HOPE foundation. It is located in Tahirpur Leprosy Complex, East Delhi. Eight hundred families with leprosy were rehabilitated here by building homes for them in 1993, creating job opportunities and providing various vocational training for the people of the village.

In 2019, 135 underserved youth underwent training in skill development in Nursing Assistant, Tally ERP-9 and Retail which is an initiative taken up by BD at the Village of HOPE project. Thirty-seven women are learning sewing and craft which is being supported by the Sevenhills company.

Prior to these projects, and in the initial years, the village residents' major source of income was from begging on the streets of Delhi. Today, several programs are run by us to rehabilitate and empower these people. The community has advanced beyond its initial beliefs and is now changing and growing and are empowering themselves. Despite these, they are still deprived in many areas. The average monthly income of a family is still below \$50. HOPE has not only been providing shelter but also has helped them to reconstruct their earlier broken lives and empowered them so as to earn

dignity and stand on their own feet by providing various skills training for the young generation: such as Basics in Computers, Nursing Assistant, Tally, Sewing and craft, Retail and Spoken English and other skills.



In 2019, 6344 leprosy wounds have been taken care of.

Sevenhills Group supported the Village of HOPE by providing bandages to people affected by leprosy. As a result of this initiative, more than 90,000 wounds have been bandaged annually. They were also instrumental in providing skills training such as basics in computers for 404 youth and sewing for women. Most of the students from sewing classes have become self-reliant and have become responsible members in their community.



Becton Dickinson Pvt. Limited Company has been instrumental in providing skills training to 235 youth in Nursing Assistant and Tally ERP. It is noteworthy that many of the Tally students have found employment and are now supporting their families financially. A majority of the students in Nursing Assistant are undergoing their OJT at various hospitals including Rajiv Gandhi Super Specialty Hospital, Swamy Nand Lal Hospital, Karuna Hospital, Garg Hospital, Vatsalya Hospital, The Leprosy Mission Hospital, Metro Hospital and others.

ASHARAN Orphanage: providing a home

HOPE foundation runs a children's home in the name of 'Asharan' at New Multan Nagar, Delhi. It is a home for the abandoned and lost children between the ages of 0 to 6 years. HOPE foundation is licensed under JJ Act 2015 by the Department of Women & Children Development. It is also licensed by the Central Adoption Resource Agency (CARA) to do adoptions, placing orphan children in adoption in India and abroad.

Our mission is to protect the children from the dangers of being ending up on the street. One of the many dangers are besides others, that it takes only minutes before a child who end up on the street to become a victim of an abuser.

We at Asharan provide the children with round the clock residential care, protection, education, opportunities to heal emotionally and physically. The children are given medical care that includes preventive and curative care. Infants and children come with a lot of requirements due to prematurity, malnourishment, infections, emotional needs, etc.

Asharan has cared for 691 children since 1997. Of these, 337 lost children were restored back to their families. Asharan was able to place 201 children in adoption since the program started. This includes 60 international adoptions and 9 NRI adoptions. It brings joy and great satisfaction to see even special need kids and older children getting adopted into loving and caring families.

What's behind her smile Is happiness the emotion behind your smile? This is not the case with Geeta (name changed). Geeta who is 4 years old, was found wandering on the street and the police brought her to Asharan through the Child welfare committee.

Her father has been traced but is found to be living on the street and is an alcoholic. The whereabouts of her mother are unknown as of now. Geeta is finding her comfort with the other children who are in a similar situation. She easily mingled with the other children. Her street training has given her some confidence. All of them

have a long way to go in dealing with their trauma. Right now, Geeta's best buddy is Ancy, who came last week after losing her mother, father and a younger brother at the same time. Though she smiles, the emotion behind is never of happiness. It is of fear, uncertainty and complete loss of control. Her looks and quietness speaks a lot.

Baby Khushi, (name changed) was born prematurely with a body weight of 800 grams. She had to be incubated and be on ventilator and intense care at the hospital for about 4 months. Baby Khushi survived this difficult time in her life. She was brought to Asharan after 4 months of her birth when she was able to survive without intensive care. She gradually developed and gained weight. She grew up to



be an adorable toddler who developed a very strong attachment towards her care givers and mentor at Asharan.

When time came for her adoption, many prospective parents were not confident to take her home knowing her prematurity and the hospitalization history. So she ended up staying at Asharan for one and a half years. This is when a beautiful

family from Bangalore noticed her details in CARA's website. They immediately decided to adopt her and had a great attitude about it. Today Khushi is happily part of her family that includes her parents and her brother. She is growing and developing normally with the love and care that she receives in her family.

Accor Center of HOPE, Mahipalpur

STARTED IN: 2013, SUPPORTED BY: Solidarity Accor

Accor Center of HOPE in Mahipalpur, Delhi, was established in 2013 with its first batch of 53 students. We train young people in retail, hospitality, spoken English, basic computers and life skills. We help them find jobs afterward through campus placements. Our graduates are working in companies such as Lifestyle stores, McDonald's, Domino's Pizza, Air India, DHL, Big Bazaar, The Chocolate Room, Ibis Hotels and Faasos.



Johar Lal Choudhary comes from a family of five. He is from a small village in West Bengal and presently residing in Mahipalpur. His father as a farmer earns Rs. 5000 a month and is the sole earning member of the family. Johar heard about the Hospitality training course through a friend. Earlier, Johar was working as housekeeping executive in a hotel for a meagre salary. He hardly dreamt of growing in his career as he had no qualifications or skills that could advance him further. He was astute enough to realize the importance of acquiring training and certification. He resigned his job and enrolled at our training center.

Johar is a very joyful person, sincere and hardworking and also holds a deep yearning to develop a career in hotel Industry and his ambition is to become a housekeeping supervisor. Presently he is undergoing his 3 months on job training in INDA in the Housekeeping Department. Here he is learning and acquiring knowledge and proficiency about chemicals and their practice, bed making and other hospitality procedures.



East Coast Region

Tharangambadi, formerly known as Tranquebar, lies 35 km north of Nagapattinam, along the Bay of Bengal, Tamil Nadu. On 26 December 2004, a massive earthquake occurred in the East Indian Ocean, with its epicenter off the west coast of Sumatra, Indonesia. The earthquake triggered a series of devastating tsunamis, one of which struck the east coast of Tamil Nadu.



One of the most devastated places in Tamil Nadu was the coastal district of Nagapattinam. In the fishing villages of Tarangambadi and Chinnangudi alone, 11,000 lives were lost, many of them being elderly and children who were left behind at home. Homes were destroyed, families separated and children orphaned and livelihood of the fishing folk destroyed. Tharangambadi and Chinnangudi, were completely annihilated. The people had to be counselled.

These efforts took the form of the Post Tsunami Relief and Rehabilitation Programme, with the support of well-wishers and sponsors. Programs were initiated to educate and to



provide skills for the children, youth, especially women. Programs were also underway to provide vocational training to fisher folk, improve healthcare and education, create Micro-financing opportunities and bring the community together to improve their living conditions and enhance their earning opportunities.

Currently, more than 800 children study at the HOPE foundation Matriculation School in Tharangambadi (from June 2005*) and in the Samsung Nursery and Primary School of HOPE at Chinnangudi (from June 2006*).

One of the prime initiatives in response to the South Asian tsunami of December 26, 2004 was launched by Manpower International (from September 2005*) in collaboration with Hope Foundation at Nagapattinam District. This collaboration has shaped the introduction of two manpower training centers at Nagapattinam and Tharangambadi. Their focus is on providing basic skills at the grassroots level so as to augment the local economy and enhance the livelihood of the people.

Samsung School of Hope – Chinnangudi

Samsung School of Hope in Chinnangudi was established by Hope foundation in association with Samsung International as a post tsunami Rehabilitation program for the underprivileged children from several fisherfolk and Dalit villages in Chinnangudi and neighboring areas of Nagapattinam District, Tamil Nadu.

The geographical coverage of the school encompasses more than 8 villages. From its inception, about 200 children get supported annually via teachers, staff and volunteers from HOPE.



Samsung School of Hope is the only school that provides English medium education to these villages. About **2000** children have already graduated from the school.

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

One exciting new development and initiative for the year 2018-19 is a program for women in the villages of Nagapattinam district. The program focuses on the mothers (of the children who are studying at the school) to get trained in skill development with the backing of Bangalore's Green Kraft, an organization producing natural fiber. The objective is to craft life style products and home accessories using the fiber and thereby augmenting towards sustaining these women and their family financially. Over **700** women benefitted through this program.



Educated women and youths are partaking in the program, these include the destitute and widows. They support their family in education, health, and as a bread winner. Women use the banana bark and make the baskets. Recently in a Local Body Election, 4 women employees contested in the election and won.

HOPE Foundation Matriculation School- Tharangambadi

Exemplary results from our students at Hope foundation school at Tarangambadi! They had a **100 percent pass results in SSLC Tamil Nadu Board examinations**. We are really thrilled to announce this achievement, as our school is the only school that got cent percent results this year in this geographical area. We would like to appreciate and uplift the children, the staff and the teachers who worked sincerely and laboured hard to achieve this feat. It should be noted that this is the **seventh consecutive year** that we are having a **100 percent** pass result for the 10th grade examinations at the school.

Hope foundation Matriculation School at Tharangambadi received an award from the Nagapattinam District Administration for Neatness of the school. Two of the school children from



Hope foundation Matriculation school Tharangambadi, participated in a Divisional level sports meet where they were awarded a cash prize of Rs. 6000 from the Sports Development Authority of Tamil Nadu.

It is really encouraging to note that 22 students participated in various sports events and many of them received prizes at divisional and district levels.

Skill Development :Tailoring



Kavitha is a housewife with three children. Her husband is a fisherman. Her earnest desire was to financially support her family as her husband's earnings were erratic and meagre. Manpower Vocational Training Center, Tharangambadi, staffed by HOPE foundation offered courses and training in various vocations. Kavitha underwent training in the tailoring course. Now she is able to stitch and she is able to earn and sustain her family financially. She really appreciates the training center for establishing these low-cost

courses for people like her which is also easily accessible geographically.

Francy Deboral is pursuing her masters in English. She is a resident of Erukattanchery village near Tharangambadi. She was in search of an institute to learn computers as the course would be helpful in completing her master's project work. She came to know about HOPE foundation at Tharangambadi. She enrolled in the course as the fees were low, as compared to other institutes. She is learning details on computer, such as the operating system, data entry and other relevant topics. She feels truly thankful to HOPE foundation for providing such high standard courses for a very low cost, which is very accommodating to people like her who cannot afford high fees.



Mumbai Region

SAP CSR activity with HOPE foundation involves in teaching various IT Skills topics such as Scratch, Explorer Functions, Social Media Usage, HTML5, Coding, Java Script, Web Development/Designing, Soft skills, Life Skills, and Spoken English. It offers these through its program called 'Code Unnati', meaning among others, the word 'improved'. The objective is to enhance the skills of the working men and women. The program is offered at Dharavi, considered the largest slum in Asia with a population close to a million. The program was started in February, 2018. We were able to train about 600 students in this center.



There are also programs to equip and upgrade economically disadvantaged students with primary education in form of Remedial/STEM education, digital literacy and computer literacy, proficiency in English Language and employee volunteering. The programs at Bandra and Khar, Mumbai, have been instrumental in undertaking these. This is the CSR activity of ARIBA INDIA PVT LTD which began in March, 2018. We were able to train about 1000 students.

This young lady has been working from the age of 15 and lives at Dharavi. She used to teach Tamil language to students and her salary was very low. She wanted to learn computers, but the institutes were charging Rs. 3000/- for the course. She was earning Rs. 5000 and that time and found it difficult to pay for it. She came to know of the course offered by HOPE.

She got trained and she updated her computer skills from the Dharavi center. She learned Advance MS office and got a job in an NGO as a data entry operator, with a salary of Rs. 10,000 per month.

Code Unnati program has helped her to update her skills and introduced her to advance software due to which she got promoted in her job.

In her community they do not allow women to study but she was supported in her endeavour by her family. She is grateful for the opportunity that she could learn multiple skills, attain confidence and get employed.



SAP also supports a **STEM Education and Digital Literacy program** for the under privileged children at Hadapsar, Pune. The program was started in March, 2017. The project is established at four different schools: ZP Manjiri BK, ZP Manjiri KH, ZP School Shewalewadi, and Sant Tukaram Madyamik Shala. The schools are under staffed and lack proper infrastructure.

SAP Code unnati software training center was started at Bhuj aiming to teach software (C, C++, HTML, web designing, etc), soft skills and English. The goal was to provide high end training for economically less fortunate. We were able to train 550 students from this center.



The project at Navsari is part of SAP 'Code unnati' program to impart computer literacy to economically disadvantaged school students at Navsari district, Gujarat. It was initiated in two phases, having a coverage of 61 schools. In the first phase 25 schools were covered and we were able to reach out to 16387 students. The second phase will cover additional 56 schools. Its vision was to besides enhancing digital literacy among students, to bring back school dropouts and provide English learning skills.

'Home of Hope' for the elderly

An old age home for women was initiated at Naigoan, Mumbai is helping the elderly to live a life with dignity. The main objectives are to promote the well-being, safety and security of older persons; to protect the rights of older persons. We want them to have the life satisfaction and if possible, identify their families and restore them to their families. It's been enriching and

joyful to see the residents live in comfort and in peace. We provide nutritious food and hygienic environment, besides recreations such as gardening, walking and TV, along with health care and therapy. At present we have eight women in the Home of HOPE.



Hope Foundation Primary School, Bhuj was started in January, 2003 as a response to the disastrous effect of the Bhuj earthquake. It was a vision to inspire the community to come to a realization of the status of education in the social arena and the removal of stigma of sending the girl child to school. Its goal was to also provide life skills to the children. The project is based in Ashapura Nagar slum. Parents of the children are low wage earners. What's really encouraging is the ratio of boys to girls which was 10:1 in the beginning has become 10:6. We have 425 students studying in the school. Innovative and out-of-box teaching methodology and collaboration with two schools from United Kingdom has been stimulating the students to achieve better results.

Besides these, special software-based teaching methods, skype sessions on projects have all enhanced the learning skills of the children.

ECOVE Centre of Hope

A joint venture by HOPE and Sevak Trust (CSR of Endurance) at Aurangabad has established the ECOVE program. It was started in August 2015 to upgrade school drop-outs, educationally and economically underprivileged as well as unemployed children of workers living in the industrial areas. The goal was to provide them with a sustainable livelihood, as well as to be a conduit between industry seeking for skilled workers. Both technical and soft skills are the main emphasis here.

In 2019, 295 students graduated from the training center and out of that 214 trainees were placed in jobs and 65 students went for higher studies.
