

Highlights of the Year 2021-22



Partnerships with companies like HCL Foundation, Wells Fargo, and OptumInsight India Private Limited for various volunteer and skill development programs.



The Dell Technologies supported ATL programme's impact has been recognised by Niti Aayog which is spearheading the ATL programme. This project is currently reaching out to 90.4% (8289) students out of 9165.



The PBGC program engaged 778 out of 913 enrolled students regularly, indicating its positive impact.



Volunteers from companies like HCL Technologies and Wells Fargo spent 422 hours engaging with students in educational and skill development activities.

Key Event Highlights 2021-22

COVID-19 Response:

- Vaccination drives were conducted for children above 15 years old in Bengaluru, vaccinating 34 students. COVID-19 orientation
- classes for staff and 10th-grade students were organized in Bengaluru, attended by 38 individuals. COVID-19 awareness and
- relief measures were implemented in the ECR region, including workshops on health and vaccine precautions with professionals and doctors from Noora Health. Oxygen units were provided to the
- Karaikal region during high COVID-19 severity.

Education and Skill Development:

- Emotional well-being workshops and vaccination training were held for school staff in Bengaluru, benefiting 20 staff members. Design thinking workshops (KIDDOVATION) and
- coding sessions (Hour of Coding and Coder Dojo) were conducted for students in Bengaluru. Virtual skill development programs were provided for 9th-grade
- students in Bengaluru, with 26 participants. The **Eduvahini** app was successfully implemented for online education,
- benefiting students in subjects like mathematics and social science.
- Regular medical check-ups and distribution of educational resources were conducted in Chennai.





Nutrition and Livelihood Support:

- **Dry ration distribution** was carried out for 298 school children in Bengaluru. Students and families in
- Chennai were supported through nutrition and educational kits. Initiatives like seaweed farming,
- Bangalore Green Kraft, microcredit scheme, and agricultural support were implemented in the ECR region. Interest-free loans and IKEA programs
- created jobs and supported livelihoods.

Achievements and Competitions:

- Bangalore and Tharangambadi students achieved a remarkable milestone by securing a 100% success rate in the 10th-grade board examinations. Students in Chennai were
- trained in Scouts and Guides and participated in various competitions, including chess and athletics.





Corporate and Volunteer Support:

- Engagement with corporate partners such as HCL Foundation, Wells Fargo, OptumInsight India, and others contributed to various initiatives and volunteer programs. Volunteer
- activities included virtual storytelling sessions and coding workshops.



Programmatic Overview

Endurance Center of Vocational Empowerment (ECOVE):

This program provided quarterly vocational training in areas like computers, electrical work, retail, and fashion design, impacting 1,478 youth, with many graduates successfully starting their own businesses.

It specifically targets those who are school drop-outs, from economically underprivileged background, and the unemployed children of workers living in the industrial area. Focus is also provided to female participants. The quarterly courses focus on finding options for sustainable livelihood, as well as to be a bridge between the industry's need for skilled workers and the aspirants.

For providing rich learning and to enable youths for the future, HOPE Foundation provides the expertise of experienced trainers, curriculum, soft-skills training (in addition to the courses) like, English, Life Skills, etc. HOPE foundation's programme delivery is based on mentoring attitude which nurtures future workers. The courses are provided on a quarterly basis and each course is held for three months. The classes are conducted daily between 9:00am to 5:00pm.

Team Visit




Bangalore Green Kraft team visited Tharangambadi and Chinnangudi units in order to understand the work nature and feasibility of work in these villages. **Mrs. Susan** CEO of BGK intervened with the women artisans to analyse the performance of the work. She motivated the team to do their work with perfection and to coordinate with the BGK team. She also suggested maintaining the manpower as the orders are in hand to meet out the buyer's expectation.







Hope Foundation plays a vital role for the community development to have their sustainable and holistic development in their life in Tharangambadi and Chinnangudi, Nagapattinam District. In the year 2018, December Bangalore Green Kraft clubbed with Hope Foundation to initiate women skill training and job opportunities. Thus, Tharangambadi, Chinnangudi and Nagapattinam women of Hope Foundation were given skill training through natural raw materials like banana barks.





COVID Response

Duringthe financial year 2021-22, theHOPEFoundation focused heavily on COVID-19 relief, providing critical support to communities across India during the ongoing pandemic. The foundation's efforts were aimed at addressing both the immediate and long-term impacts of COVID-19, with strong backing from corporate partners and donors.



Oxygen Plant Installation:

In response to community health needs, the Hope Foundation has initiated the installation of an oxygen plant at the Government hospital, with the support of Collector Mrs. Lalitha IAS. This plant will greatly enhance local healthcare resources, as it is placed in a dedicated shed near the hospital's manifold room. While the electricity connection remains pending—requiring an additional investment of 27 lakh INR—Mrs. Lalitha has assured us that arrangements are in progress, and connection will be provided at the earliest possible opportunity. This initiative reflects our foundation's dedication to improving critical healthcare infrastructure despite the challenges of time and resource mobilization.

COVID-19 Relief Work Highlights



Distribution of Essential Supplies:

During the COVID-19 pandemic relief efforts, a total of **13,076 grocery kits** were distributed across all regions, including Delhi, Mumbai, Bangalore, Chennai, and the East Coast.

Medical Assistance:

Provided **30 cots and mattresses** to COVID Care Centers and the pediatric ward in Karaikal, ensuring better care for affected patients.

COVID-19 Relief Activities: Medical Kits, Oxygen Concentrators & Oxygen Generation Plants

The COVID-19 pandemic created an unprecedented health crisis, and HOPE Foundation, with the generous support of Dell Technologies, Microsoft, GMAC, and SAP, responded with targeted relief to strengthen government hospitals.

COVID-19 Kits: We distributed 61,700 kits (PPE, sanitizers, disinfectants) to 16 government institutions, protecting frontline healthcare workers and ensuring safer patient care.

Oxygen Concentrators: To address acute shortages, 162 oxygen concentrators were delivered to hospitals, enabling continuous oxygen support for patients in critical need.

Oxygen Generation Plants: With donor support, we established oxygen generation plants in government hospitals, funded by Dell Technologies, SAP, and Microsoft—each capable of supplying oxygen for 50—100 hospital beds, ensuring reliable and sustainable access during surges.

These interventions not only saved lives during the peak of the crisis but also strengthened the long-term capacity of hospitals to respond to future emergencies. We remain deeply grateful to our donors and partners whose generosity made this life-saving impact possible.

She believes her ability to grow in terms of her technical knowledge along coupled with insights on how to find, keep and grow on the job, led to the position of Senior Enterprise Database Administrator, at Cerner Corporation. Her annual income of Rs.9.5 lakhs (\$12,837) is however just a steppingstone towards her real dream – of opening a classical dance academy.


